Arguments concerning socialism

Extract 1

Karl Marx and Friedrich Engels argued that "the history of all hitherto existing society is the history of class struggles. Freeman and slave, patrician and plebeian, lord and serf, guild-master and journeyman, in a word, oppressor and oppressed, stood in constant opposition to one another ... a fight that each time ended, either in a revolutionary reconstitution of society at large, or in the common ruin of the contending classes.

The modern bourgeois society that has sprouted from the ruins of feudal society has not done away with class antagonisms. It has ... established new classes, new conditions of oppression, new forms of struggle in place of the old ones.

Our epoch, the epoch of the bourgeoisie, possesses, however, this distinct feature: it has simplified class antagonisms. Society as a whole is more and more splitting up into two great hostile camps, into two great classes directly facing each other – Bourgeoisie and Proletariat."

Extract 2

According to Anthony Giddens, "The [Labour] government has concentrated upon investment in education as the main means of improving mobility. This is important, but almost certainly not enough. One of the lessons we may learn from the Scandinavians is that mobility increases as inequality decreases. Reducing inequality and creating greater chances of mobility are not alternatives, but are interdependent. Education often reflects wider inequalities rather than muting them. We have to work to reduce inequalities at source if we want to establish a fairer society."
