Interpretation A An interpretation of the Great Plague

Plague was the most feared disease. People did not know its cause. The deaths from the Great Plague were under-recorded because the 'searchers' could be bribed. Magistrates tried to control the disease by bringing in a number of measures. If you visited London in the late summer of 1665, your memory of the experience would probably never leave you. There were bodies in the street, boarded-up houses, and a mournful silence. Nowhere was safe. More people died in London than in the rest of England.
