Serena Williams beats sister Venus to claim Australian Open title and record 23rd grand slam

Serena Williams' 23rd major title, catapulting her beyond Steffi Graf as the most decorated champion of the Open era, can be depicted either as a stirring affirmation or a chilling warning.

It is easy enough to subscribe to the first school of thought, given the serenity with which she swept aside sister Venus for a 6-4, 6-4 victory and a seventh Australian Open title, itself another record in a career creaking under the weight of its own history.

What tennis struggles to accept, though, is the counter-argument that Serena's sustained pre-eminence casts her would-be rivals in a deeply unflattering light. For all that the sport bathed in a soothing all-our-yesterdays feel at Melbourne Park, as Venus and Serena met in a Grand Slam final 16 years after their first, it needed also to come to terms with the pitiful lack of depth among the chasing pack.

The reality is that Serena, at the age of 35 – Graf, let it be noted, retired at 30 – has won her latest major without dropping a single set and despite playing nowhere close to her best. Just listen to the verdict of her coach, Patrick Mouratoglou. "She played well enough to win, but she can play much better," said the Frenchman, doing little to enthuse about a match where, yet again, sport's most celebrated sister act seldom caught light.

In nine major finals between this pair, only two have gone to a third set. The love and respect that Venus and Serena never tire of expressing for one another equates on court to an inescapable lack of intensity, to a feeling that, even after 28 meetings on tour, they have never quite become used to facing across the net for such heightened stakes.

Nick Kyrgios returns fire at Rafael Nadal 'respect' criticism

- **Australian records remarkable three-set win**
- **Former world No 13 is booed by home crowd**

Nick Kyrgios has returned serve at Rafael Nadal, saying he wouldn't "listen at all" to the world No 2 after the Spaniard said he needed to show more respect to himself, his opponents and the crowd.

The Australian displayed some of his best form when beating Nadal in a tight three-setter at the Mexican Open on Wednesday in Acapulco, saving three match points to register a 3-6, 7-6 (7-2), 7-6 (8-6) victory, his best result in almost two years. But the high-quality spectacle didn't translate into positive words for the former world No 13.

There were several flashpoints in the match but Nadal appeared most incensed when Kyrgios complained about the time this year's Australian Open runner-up was taking between points on the Canberran's serve.

It prompted Nadal to say in a post-match media conference that Kyrgios should be fighting for grand slams under the No 1 ranking but "lacks respect for the crowd, his opponent and towards himself".

Responding after Nadal's comments, Kyrgios seemed non-plussed.

"I'm different. Rafa's different. He can focus on what he needs to do," Kyrgios said.

"He doesn't know the journey I've been through. He doesn't know anything about me so I'm not going to listen at all."

Kyrgios, one of the fastest players on tour between points, then took aim at Nadal, who is among the slowest.

Border Patrol agent appeared to be ambushed by illegal immigrants, bashed with rocks before death

Border patrol ambush prompts massive manhunt

Illegal immigrants appeared to have “ambushed” two U.S. Border Patrol agents near the Texas border with Mexico and bashed their heads with blunt objects – possibly rocks – killing one agent and sending another to a hospital in serious condition Sunday, a National Border Patrol Council (NBPC) official told Fox News.

Rogelio Martinez, 36, was killed and another agent, who has not been identified, was injured while they were patrolling the Big Bend Sector, leading authorities to scour West Texas for the attackers, officials said. Although few details about the incident have been released, Brandon Judd, the president of the NBPC, told Fox News on Monday it appeared Martinez and the second agent were “ambushed” by a group of illegal immigrants.

“We don’t know exactly what happened because we weren’t there. However, just from agents that were working in the area, reports are saying it was an attack and it would appear to be an ambush,” Judd said.

He added: “There’s a high likelihood this was an assault on the agents.”

Martinez and his partner suffered traumatic injuries to the head and other injuries such as broken bones, FBI El Paso said in a news release. Judd earlier told Fox News Martinez died of blunt force trauma to the head, indicating the attackers most likely used a rock or rocks during the assault on the two agents. The area surrounding where the attack occurred also indicated rocks were likely used as weapons. An FBI official also said that, counter to initial reports, neither agent was shot.

“There were no indications the agents fired their weapons,” Judd said, citing accounts he received from agents who responded to the incident. He also said there were no signs of a stabbing.

Martinez was notified there was illegal immigrant traffic in the area while the agents were patrolling near Interstate 10, in the Van Horn Station area, according to Judd. He began following “footprints” on a trail when the attack occurred.

Judd said details remained foggy on what led to the ambush and the FBI was investigating the incident.

Judd did not further comment on the second agent’s condition.

The Border Patrol website lists 38 agents, not including Martinez, who have died since late 2003 — some attacked while working along the border and others killed in traffic accidents. Martinez is the second agent to have died this year.

President Trump tweeted Sunday night: "Border Patrol Officer killed at Southern Border, another badly hurt. We will seek out and bring to justice those responsible. We will, and must, build the Wall!"

Text D is an extract of a response from The Guardian's Dear Mariella feature published in 2018. Each week, journalist Mariella Frostrup deals with a reader's dilemma. In this piece, entitled I've got a top degree, but I'm stuck washing dishes, the reader has a degree in Medical Sciences but cannot get a job as they live in a poor coastal town and cannot afford to move. They have become depressed as a result.

Mariella replies: Hello out there. I'm so glad you wrote. One thing is very clear – you write a good letter! I might not want to live in a “destitute coastal town” but it's a vivid and evocative way of describing your location. It won't help you to know how many thousands of young people like you are struggling against the odds. Despite the crisis among our youth we remain fixated on our dysfunctional divorce from Europe. Instead of conjuring new opportunities, we've spent the past years blaming the lack of them on our nearest neighbours.

I fear for us all when it's revealed that it wasn't migrants or Europeans who are responsible for our stagnation, but a series of UK governments more interested in hanging on to power than leading their citizens towards a prosperous and sustainable future.

This may seem too big a picture to be helpful, especially considering the microscopic place you're allowing yourself in the universe, but understanding that your situation isn't personal is a very important first step. Robert Kennedy once exhorted warmongers, “Don't get mad, get even,” but I think getting angry can be very healthy indeed. It's been rage more often than not that's dragged me up from the gutter.

You've sought career advice, which is sensible, but you need clinical help to overcome the torpor you're experiencing. Try rethink.org as a first step. Depression can indiscriminately afflict the most fortunate as well as the least and, just because your case seems a justifiable reaction to your circumstances, it doesn't mean you can allow it to dictate your actions. You have every right to feel the way you do. It's bloody hard to keep motivating yourself when doors are being shut in your face, but perseverance is exactly what's required. Mustering resilience and determination is directly at odds with what depression makes you feel like doing. Ideally, jobs sustain and inspire us, but for the vast majority of people employment is what you do to facilitate a life outside of work.

You have had a great education and done brilliantly, but it hasn't covered how to survive in a big bad world that seems blind to your imprint. That's where determination comes in.

If I were your age, I'd be getting involved in politics. We desperately need young, intelligent, articulate people to change the downward trajectory. Joining a local group won't cost money and won't solve your professional woes, but it will put you among potentially like-minded people, who want to improve the town's fortunes and may even become friends. Similarly, I'd have thought that you would be a very well qualified volunteer, whether for a project, an NGO abroad, or an organisation nearer where you live. A burst of philanthropic activity won't look at all bad on your CV and may provide the sort of larger horizon you really need. Be the change you want to see, said Gandhi – and there is not only sense in his statement but also a call to arms.

You are not alone, or unique, but one of the many thousands of young people struggling to find meaning, purpose and something to do with their degree.
